HOW TARANAKI FITS YOUR ITINERARY

Just a 50-minute flight from Auckland and Wellington, and 90-minutes from Christchurch, Taranaki is very accessible with Air New Zealand flights arriving at New Plymouth Airport regularly throughout the day.

- Day 5: Drive around the maunga by heading down Surf Highway 45 to Hawera and back to Stratford, enjoying many of the experiences along the way. Enjoy the journey along the Forgotten World Highway to the Republic of Whangamōmona (2.5 hours).
- Day 6: Enjoy Whangamōmona and drive to Rotorua for the night (3.5 hours).
- Day 7: Morning activity in Rotorua, return to Auckland



CLIMATE

Taranaki's lone central mountain means the region has unique weather patterns: it sits in a sweet spot of high rainfall on the mountain yet it's also home to some of New Zealand's sunniest spots closer to the coast. In fact, New Plymouth claimed the most sunshine hours in NIWA's annual climate report for 2021 and 2022. Temperatures range from 20-27 degrees in summer (December to February) to 4-12 degrees in winter (June to August).

BY ROAD

Taranaki can be accessed from the north and south on State Highway 3 and from the east along the scenic Forgotten World Highway (SH43). Once in Taranaki, Surf Highway 45 is a great touring route used to discover coastal towns and surf breaks on the Taranaki coastline between New Plymouth and Hāwera, while a direct inland route connects the region's major towns. Regular scheduled bus services operate both north and south from Taranaki, and within New Plymouth city, and between New Plymouth and Hāwera.

BY BICYCLE

The Forgotten World Cycle Trail is the first on-road addition to the New Zealand Cycle Trail, and offers a challenging yet scenic 180km link between the central North Island and Taranaki via quiet country roads. The route features two unsealed sections and several large hills. Accommodation and supplies are available at Whangamōmona, Purangi and Lepperton. Allow 2-3 days to reach Taranaki from Taumaranui. Alternatively, the Kōpiko Aotearoa Cycle Trail starts at East Cape in Tairāwhiti and ends at Cape Egmont in Taranaki. Cutting across the centre of the North Island, this 1071km cycle trail takes 5-12 days to complete.







Before man walked upon the shores of Aotearoa it is said that many magnificent mountain gods lived in the centre of Te Ika a Maui – the fish of Maui (the North Island). The male maunga of Ruapehu, Tongariro, Ngauruhoe, Taranaki and Tauhara stood proudly on the Central Plateau, alongside a lone female mountain Pihanga.

All the maunga wanted to win the heart of the striking Pihanga, but none more so than Taranaki and Tongariro. The two fought so fiercely for her love that the earth shook, lightening crashed, and lava flowed down the warring maunga.

Despite a long, and fierce challenge from Taranaki, Tongariro emerged victorious, and a defeated Taranaki was banished to the west – led to safety by te Toka a Rahotu, a large boulder that guided Taranaki to his new home on the west coast and to where he stands today. As he travelled it is said Taranaki carved out the Whanganui River, before he settled beside the beautiful mountain range Pouākai, who put his arm around Taranaki and embraced him.

These days the 2518m volcanic peak – which last erupted in 1755 – offers countless adventures through untouched bush and alpine environments. To get the full story, head to one of the Department of Conservation visitor centres at the top of the North Egmont or Dawson Falls mountain access roads, or stop in at the Stratford Mountain House.

TARANAKI MAUNGA

There are more than 200km of walking tracks to explore, ranging from accessible trails that lead through enchanting forests and picturesque alpine landscapes, to more challenging hikes. Taranaki Maunga has a walk for everyone.

THE POUĀKAI CROSSING - SELF LEAD

Mount Taranaki's Pouākai Crossing is gaining momentum as one of New Zealand's greatest one-day walks. Best suited for those with a reasonable level of fitness, the walk crosses the slopes of Mount Taranaki, taking around eight hours to complete.

Beginning at North Egmont Visitor Centre, the crossing heads up and across Mount Taranaki, with stunning summit and landscape views varying from alpine to lush forest as the route passes beneath towering lava cliffs and over the remarkable Ahukawakawa Wetlands. Holly Hut offers a handy mid-point, and the scenic highlight is the Pouākai Tarn – mountain lake – which can offer a spectacular reflection of the 2518m summit. Weir Tours can offer a return shuttle to your customer's accommodation.

THE POUĀKAI CROSSING LATE SPRING, SUMMER AND EARLY AUTUMN

This one-day walk across the northern side of Mount Taranaki takes you on a 19km trek through landscapes ranging from the montane forest and subalpine scrub, beneath towering lava columns, across active erosion scars, and through a scenic alpine wetland. The unique flora along the route makes it a lesson in botanical adaptation. After crossing the unique Ahukawakawa Wetland, the climb up on to the Pouākai Plateau offers breath-taking views of the route, with Taranaki Maunga as a backdrop, and the opportunity for the postcard-perfect shot of the mountain reflected in the tarn – alpine lake – on top of the plateau. The route is challenging and requires a high level of fitness. Departing from North Egmont Visitor Centre, walkers will require comfortable and waterproof hiking shoes, rain and sun protection, food and water, a backpack and suitable hiking clothing.

POUĀKAI TARN

For a more concise journey to the picturesque Pouākai Tarns, embark on a 2 to 2 1/2-hour hike from the Mangorei Road car park, just a 20-minute drive from New Plymouth.


This trail requires good physical fitness, spanning 5 kilometers uphill with predominantly wooden steps and a batten boardwalk. Ascending through regenerating forest, mountain cedar, and low alpine scrub, the path leads to the 16-bunk Pouākai Hut (reservation required). Choose between an overnight stay at the hut (advanced booking necessary) or descend back down.


Approximately 700 meters past the hut, experience panoramic views of Ahukawakawa Swamp. Continue on the Pouākai Track for an additional ten minutes to discover the Pouākai Tarns, renowned for its mirror-like reflection of Taranaki Maunga.

THE TARANAKI CROSSING

Anticipated for completion in early April 2024, The Taranaki Crossing stands as a transformative project within Te Papakura o Taranaki/Egmont National Park, linking a network of walking tracks on the iconic Taranaki Maunga. Comprising 25 kilometers of trails, it encompasses a blend of short walks, day hikes, and serves as the foundation for a multi-day walking experience on the Maunga.

The Taranaki Crossing presents two enticing options: a comprehensive two-to-three-day tramp, inclusive of overnight stays in Maunga huts, or a collection of day walks. Among these, the most popular is expected to be a one-hour return journey from the Plateau to the Manganui Lodge and Ski-field area. The new 109m-long suspension bridge will sit 50m above the Manganui Gorge.





Tawhiti Museum has long been a Taranaki must-do and has been recognised as the third best museum in New Zealand by Trip Advisor users, right behind Te Papa in Wellington and Auckland Museum, making it the country's best privately-owned museum.

Tawhiti Museum is a truly unique experience. The innovative and interactive museum uses dozens of life-size exhibits and hundreds of scale models and thousands of authentic artefacts to capture the past in a series of superrealistic displays.

While the museum, working railway, machine hall, café and on-site pottery studio are fascinating, it's the museum's Traders & Whalers ride that is truly spectacular. Visitors walk down through underground tunnels (modelled by Weta Workshop) and enter an underground canal-boat ride through Taranaki's heritage.

Te Whare Hononga means *The House That Binds* – a creative partnership between Ngāti Te Whiti hapū and Taranaki Cathedral's Church of St Mary, sharing the message of justice and reconciliation. Te Whare Hononga offers a free exhibition exploring the shared history of the area.

Te Whare Hononga is a whare wānanga – a flexible purpose-built education space that allows its intent to emerge with each visitor's experience. It is a home of story-telling, rich with visual elements to spark the imagination. Every detail has been crafted by Mana Whenua (indigenous people who hold authority over the area) to inspire the journey of honest reflection.

Visitors are invited to watch the nine-minute animated video, an honest retelling of St Mary's conflicted relationship with Taranaki Māori, paying special attention to voices that have called for peace for generations.

There are four contemporary pou, each with an interactive multimedia display, to help us explore the following areas:

- Whakapapa connections to people & creation
- Mana Motuhake indigenous decision-making
- Taonga Tuku Iho caring for environmental treasures
- Whakapono perspectives of faith, hope & love

The Architecture is inspired by the image of a kono (food basket) – the wooden beams placed in a woven pattern, with points of meeting, crossing, and uniting. The building sits as a parallelogram orientated to face Paritutu.

Self-quided visit: Free of charge, koha appreciated

We recommend giving yourself an hour on site: 30 minutes to walk around the Cathedral grounds and 30 minutes to watch the video and explore the exhibition touch screens in Te Whare Hononga. Volunteers are available most days to offer manaakitanga and answer questions.

Hosted visit: \$5 per person

A host will meet you in the courtyard outside Te Whare Hononga for a 5-10 minute introductory talk to the space, to answer basic questions and point out areas of interest, then will leave you to explore at your own pace.

Guided group tour: \$150 per tour, for 10-30 people (\$15 per person, with a 10-person minimum)

This 60-minute guided tour gives an overview of the history connected to Pūkākā Pā, the Land Wars, and how those stories connect to Taranaki Cathedral. We visit the settler gravesite, the Waikato Warriors' Memorial, and then spend time in Te Whare Hononga viewing the video and exhibition screens, with time for Q&A.

TARANAKI MAUNGA TOUR

Take a tour around the magnificent Taranaki Maunga, standing proudly at 2,518 metres high. It is the grand gem of the Taranaki region and is surrounded by the lush forest of Te Papakura o Taranaki / Egmont National Park. The volcano last erupted in 1755 AD and is now considered dormant.

Our flight departs from New Plymouth Airport heading south along the coast, past New Plymouth City, Port Taranaki, Paritutu, and the Sugarloaf Islands towards the headwaters of the Stony River where the trip then ascends towards the volcano summit (weather permitting). From there, we swoop down to the Ahukawakawa swamp, Pouākai and Kaitake Ranges before returning to the airport.

JURASSIC WATERFALL TOUR

Matapeka Falls (Jurassic Falls) is a remote waterfall in North Taranaki, hidden amongst native pristine bushland. The area is private and secluded for this amazing getaway.

Our flight departs from New Plymouth Airport heading north along the rugged West Coast coastline, past Urenui, White Cliffs and Parininihi Forest to the mouth of the Tongapōrutu River, then travelling inland up the Hutiwai wetland. We land at the base of the waterfall, where you can have a short bush walk, swim, or bite to eat while you enjoy the tranquility. When the skies are crystal clear, you can see across to the Central Plateau mountain ranges as well as Taranaki Maunga to the south on the flight back.


